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INTRODUCTION

Why Safety Today Looks Different

The other day I noticed a few kids playing near the side of my yard in an area that is not easily visible from the street. Nothing bad was happening, but it reminded me of something important.

Kids do not always recognize environments that adults immediately see as risky.

The same thing happens online.

Children move through digital spaces and physical spaces all day long. To them it is one world. Playing outside, chatting in games, watching videos, and talking with friends.

But to parents these spaces can carry different kinds of risks.

Safety today is not just about telling kids what not to do. It is about helping them learn how to recognize situations and make better decisions.

In cybersecurity, professionals follow a simple process to manage risk.

That same mindset can help families teach children how to move safely through both digital spaces and the real world.

Parents can use a similar approach to help children stay safe both online and offline.

This guide introduces five simple steps families can use every day.

- **NOTICE**
- **PREPARE**
- **WATCH**
- **ACT**
- **LEARN**

STEP 1: NOTICE

Teach Kids to Recognize Their Environment

The first step in safety is awareness.

Kids often focus on the activity they are doing rather than the environment they are in. This is true whether they are playing outside or interacting online.

Help children learn to notice things like:

- Are they playing in a visible area?
- Do they know the people they are talking to online?
- Are they sharing personal information without realizing it?
- Is something making them feel uncomfortable?

Parents can ask questions like:

- Who else can see where you are playing right now?
- Do you know the person you are talking to in that game?
- Would you share that same information with a stranger in real life?

The goal is not fear. The goal is awareness.



STEP 2: PREPARE

Set Safety Rules Before Problems Happen

In cybersecurity, preparation is one of the most important steps. Families can do the same thing.

Create simple family safety guidelines.

Outdoor Safety

- Play in areas adults can see.
- Stay within agreed boundaries.
- Tell a parent where you are going.

Online Safety

- Never share your address, school, or phone number.
- Do not accept friend requests from strangers.
- Ask before downloading new apps or games.
- Kids do better when expectations are clear ahead of time.

STEP 3: WATCH

Stay Involved Without Hovering

Parents do not need to monitor every moment of their child's life, but staying involved matters.

Pay attention to patterns.

Watch for things like:

- Kids suddenly becoming secretive about devices
- Changes in mood after gaming or social media
- Children wanting to play in isolated areas outside
- New online friends you have never heard about

Just like cybersecurity systems monitor unusual activity, parents can stay observant and engaged.

Special Note for Parents

Every child develops at a different pace. The goal is not to hover over every moment, but to give children space to build independence and confidence as they grow. At the same time, parenting is not a rigid rulebook. If your instincts tell you to watch more closely in a particular moment, trust that instinct.

In cybersecurity, professionals use a concept called device hardening, adding stronger protections when something is especially important or vulnerable. Parents do something similar.

- Sometimes you step back and observe.
- Sometimes you step closer and guide.
- Sometimes you step in immediately.

Your job is not to follow perfect rules. Your job is to protect and prepare your child.

STEP 4: ACT

What to Do When Something Feels Off

Kids need to know exactly what to do when something feels uncomfortable or confusing.

Teach them simple actions.

Online

- Block suspicious users.
- Leave chats or games that feel unsafe.
- Tell a trusted adult immediately.

Offline

- Move to a visible or safe area.
- Contact a parent or guardian.
- Trust their instincts if something feels wrong.

Children should always know they will not get in trouble for speaking up.

STEP 5: LEARN

Every Situation Is a Teaching Moment

In cybersecurity, incidents are reviewed so organizations can improve. Families can do the same thing.

If something happens online or outside, talk about it together.

Ask questions like:

- What did you notice?
- What helped you realize something felt wrong?
- What could we do differently next time?

These conversations help kids build confidence and judgment.

WRAP-UP

Safety is not about controlling every moment of a child's life.

It is about helping them move through the world with awareness, confidence, and better decision making.

Whether kids are playing outside with friends or exploring online games, the same skills apply.

When families practice these steps together, safety becomes a shared responsibility.

Kids grow up better prepared to navigate both the digital world and the real world.

AQ'S Corner Family Safety Checklist

Online and Outside Safety

Parents can review this checklist with their children.

Awareness

- My child understands not to share personal information online.
- My child knows to play in visible areas outside.
- My child knows how to recognize situations that feel uncomfortable.

Preparation

- We have family rules for internet use.
- My child asks before downloading apps or games.
- My child tells us where they are going when playing outside.

Observation

- I check in regularly about online activities.
- I know the games and apps my child uses.
- I encourage open conversations about experiences.

Action

- My child knows how to block suspicious users.
- My child knows to leave situations that feel unsafe.
- My child knows they can always tell a trusted adult.

Learning

- We talk about online and real world experiences together.
- We update family safety rules when needed.
